Message from IDVA Director Terry Prince

Illinois continues to demonstrate its ongoing commitment to veterans through the Introduction of Senate Bill (SB) 3737, which will create the Servicemember Education Rights Veneration (SERVE) Act. The General Assembly recognizes the common public interest in safeguarding and promoting participation in military service to the United States and the State by minimizing disadvantages to military service while pursuing higher education.

Additionally, IDVA participated in the **2026 Home Illinois Summit**. "Rising With Resilience" was the theme for this year's summit that welcomed over 500 participants and brought together advocates, service providers, policymakers, and individuals with lived experience from across Illinois. They focused on five key areas: **Innovations and Successes, Staff and Community Resiliency, Program Technical Assistance, Artistic Offerings, Unsheltered Homelessness**. The **2026 Home Illinois Summit** spotlighted the remarkable individuals and organizations across Illinois who often work behind the scenes to create real, lasting change for people experiencing housing insecurity. The Service Members - Serve Act Passes: Protecting Access to Higher Education for Illinois Servicemembers and their Families Legislation Passes

The Illinois General Assembly passed SB 3737, which protects access to higher education for Illinois servicemembers and their families, ensuring they are not academically penalized when military duty interrupts their higher education.

Initiated by Illinois Attorney General Kwame Raoul, the legislation was unanimously passed and extends protections to spouses whose education is adversely impacted by a servicemember's military obligations and prohibits discrimination based on military status.

The legislation mirrors the federal SERVE Act, 20 U.S.C. §1091c, which is enforced by the Department of Education and outlines higher education readmission requirements for servicemembers. It will provide another level of protection for servicemembers through the Attorney General's enforcement and will also:

- Require higher education institutions to accommodate academic military leave when students are called to service.
- Ensure readmission rights following completion of military duty, including readmission with the same enrollment status, number of credit hours, academic standing and academic progress.
- Provide for reimbursement by the higher education institution of expenses, including tuition and fees, charged during the period of military service.
- Require reasonable academic accommodations, such as flexible deadlines or alternate assignments.

Home Illinois Summit

The 2026 Home Illinois Summit. “Rising With Resilience” was attended by over 500 advocates, service providers, policymakers, and individuals from across Illinois to collaborate on innovative, community-driven solutions to homelessness. The two-day summit offered discussion groups, workshops, and networking. Director Prince moderated a panel, “A Changing Landscape: What the Future Holds for Illinois Communities and People Experiencing Homelessness.” The panelists included:

The session featured a conversation between members of the Illinois Interagency Task Force on Homelessness and members of the Illinois Community Advisory Council on Homelessness. Attendees gained insight into systemic pressures and the shifting landscape of federal policy, with a specific focus on the potential challenges of the HUD Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO). This discussion explored strategies tailored to Illinois’ most vulnerable populations, focusing on youth, veterans, and aging

adults and emphasizing the urgent need for resilient, cross-sector collaboration to ensure housing stability for all Illinoisans.

- **Key Focus Areas**
- **Innovations and Successes:** Highlighting effective strategies, policy advancements, and programmatic successes, particularly those supported through Home Illinois and other state initiatives.
- **Staff and Community Resiliency:** Exploring strategies to prevent burnout, strengthen workforce sustainability, and support resilience among staff, partners, and communities.
- **Program Technical Assistance:** Building capacity in program design, management, reporting, compliance, and implementation to improve outcomes.
- **Artistic Offerings:** Featuring visual art, music, video, and other creative expressions that reflect lived experience, housing insecurity, and work in the homeless services field.
- **Unsheltered Homelessness:** Sharing evidence-based practices for supporting unsheltered individuals, communicating best practices, and addressing the harms of criminalization trends.

Melissa Beckford, *Army*

Melissa Beckford is an Army veteran with nine years of combined service, a licensed clinician, and an advocate with over 15 years of public service. She currently serves as the Northern Region Supervisor for the Illinois Department of Veterans Affairs (IDVA), overseeing field operations across northern Illinois and guiding Veteran Service Officers to ensure veterans and their families receive state and federal benefits. She also manages the IDVA Peer Review process, ensuring statewide claims meet quality standards and identifying training needs. Melissa joined IDVA in July 2017 as a Veteran Service Officer and advanced into regional leadership. Prior to her state role, she served as a VSO with the Winnebago County Veterans Assistance Commission, supporting homeless veterans, women veterans, and those facing barriers to care.

Melissa holds a Bachelor of Science in Social Science from Troy University and a Master of Science in Professional Counseling from Grand Canyon University. She is a Licensed Clinical Mental Health Counselor and is pursuing her Doctor of Psychology (PsyD) to further expand her clinical and leadership expertise in serving trauma-affected populations.

She began her military career as a Supply Specialist in the Army Reserves and later served on active duty as an Administrative Specialist at Fort Benning, Georgia. While at the Western Hemisphere Institute for Security Cooperation (WHINSEC), she used her bilingual skills to train Latin American soldiers. She later became a Mental Health Specialist and served overseas in several humanitarian missions, in a MASH unit, and at Landstuhl Regional Medical Center in Germany, supporting soldiers with PTSD and other trauma-related conditions.

Melissa is a Board Member of the Homefront 815 Center, a nonprofit organization dedicated to supporting veterans experiencing financial hardship and other barriers to care. She is also a former member of the City of Rockford Zoning Board and Veterans Drop-in Center and a passionate advocate for survivors of domestic violence, veterans, and immigrants, providing pro bono or low-cost counseling and psychological evaluations. In 2023, she was featured in the documentary *Take Your Own Notes*, highlighting the resilience, leadership, and lasting impact of women veterans in the Rockford, Illinois area.

Ms. Latham is a graduate of the National American Legion College and has served as a facilitator and department chair for the program, contributing to the education and preparation of Legion leaders statewide and nationally. She is also a dedicated advocate for student veterans, serving as an advisor to Student Veterans of America at Northern Illinois University, where she supports student success and leadership development. Professionally, she serves as an Associate Vice President at Northern Illinois University. Her career reflects a sustained commitment to service, leadership, and the advancement of veterans and future leaders.

The event introduced the revitalized Veterans Resource Center, which provides resources, support, and guidance for student veterans.

The celebration also provided an opportunity for community leaders and partner organizations to connect with students, introduce themselves, and discuss the services and support available through their respective departments and organizations. Community leaders also had the opportunity to meet with Heather L. Smith, Veterans & Military Services Coordinator, to discuss ongoing support and collaboration efforts for student veterans.

Memorial Day

IDVA commemorated Memorial Day at ceremonies in its five Veterans' Homes and attended national and local ceremonies. The team dispersed across the state to demonstrate to veterans and their communities that we are united in remembering those who gave the ultimate sacrifice and in gratitude for the freedoms they protected for generations to come.



Marine Corps Veteran and IDVA Chief of Staff Jassen Strokosch participated in a "Murph" event at the Veterans' Home at Quincy. The "Hero Workout" was created in tribute to U.S. Navy SEAL Lt. Michael P. Murphy, who was killed in action in Afghanistan on June 28, 2005. He was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor. The Quincy Family YMCA organized the challenge, which includes a one-mile run, 100 pull-ups, 200 push-ups, 300 air squats, and ends with another one-mile run.



The Chicago Veterans Ruck March brought the community together in a shared commitment to supporting veterans and advancing suicide prevention awareness. IDVA Chief of Staff & Marine Corps veteran Jassen Strokosch and IDVA Legislative Liaison and Army National Guard Capt. Dylan Hopp participated and, while working hard, enjoyed a day of fellowship and remembrance.



At the Nation's 158th Official Memorial Day Observance at Arlington Cemetery, IDVA Director Terry Prince represented Illinois and the National Association of State Directors of Veterans Affairs (NASDVA) as its president. He participated in the traditional parade of colors of veterans' organizations and laid a wreath around the perimeter of the Memorial Amphitheater to honor the service and sacrifice of those who gave their lives for our nation. The Memorial Day Observance is the culmination of three days of recognition, including Flags in, where the 3rd U.S. Infantry Regiment, known as the Old Guard, places small American flags at over 260,000 graves. On Sunday, Flowers of Remembrance Day, visitors are invited to place flowers at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and at gravesites.

Arlington National Cemetery honors those who have served our nation over 639 acres of rolling green hills and trees dating back hundreds of years. The carefully designed landscape demonstrates respect for those who are laid to rest and is a beautiful space for visitors
