Winter Winnings

Illinois' Lottery Ticket Supporting

On November 1st, The Illinois Lottery launched its Veterans Instant Ticket in Illinois – Winter Winnings! The Winter Winnings \$2 lottery tickets are sold between November through February and players can win up to \$20,000. Once prizes are paid out, the funds raised by the lottery tickets are distributed by the Illinois Department of Veterans' Affairs through Veterans Cash Grants to programs providing vital services to veterans including: job training, housing assistance, post-traumatic stress treatment, health insurance costs, long-term care, disability benefits, and employment.

On a quarterly basis, IDVA's committee reviews applications and awards grants to groups that have demonstrated proven need. Eligibility is open to government agencies, not-for-profits, veterans' organizations, and tax-exempt entities currently providing veterans' assistance or wishing to expand to veterans' assistance. Winter Winnings is the first lottery game in the United States to designate 100 percent of net proceeds to veterans. Launched in 2006, the Illinois Lottery has provided IDVA with the resources to award more than \$18 million in grants to approximately 400 veterans organizations statewide.

In October, IDVA announced the grant recipients for the fourth quarter of FY2022.

- **Goodwill Industries** of Central, IL was awarded \$30,000 to support the Veterans Employment Program and the Central Illinois Stand Down for Homeless Veterans event. This grant will positively impact 320 veterans and their families in Peoria and surrounding communities with employment opportunities and by providing much needed resources and supplies for the upcoming winter months.

- **Impacting Veterans Lives Inc., dba Midwest Veterans Closet**, was awarded \$97,684 to provide a one-stop shopping experience without cost for homeless veterans and those at risk. They proudly bill themselves as, "a super spreader of food, goods, and dignity for our military heroes." They also assist active-duty personnel assigned to the Navy bootcamp and training center in Great Lakes, IL. This grant is expected to impact up to 12,000 veterans, servicemembers and their families.

In announcing the grants, Director Terry Prince said, "Veterans' Cash Grants is an opportunity for organizations to gain critical funds to operate and make a significant impact on veterans. We are pleased to award these grants to Goodwill of Central IL and Midwest Veterans Closet and thank them for their partnership in serving Illinois' 600,000 veterans and countless family members. They represent just two of the thousands of organizations supporting veterans and their families. Coast Guard Women's Reserve

On November 23, 1942, President Franklin Roosevelt signed Public Law 772 creating the Women's Reserve of the U.S. Coast Guard Reserve program. The Women's Reserve of the Coast Guard later adopted the nick name SPARs, named after the Coast Guard motto "Semper Paratus-Always Ready". During World War II, a total of 978 women officers and 11,868 enlisted women served in the SPARs. The women of the SPARs boldly served our country, but not without challenges. In 1973, congressional legislation ended the Women's Reserve and permitted women to officially join the active-duty Coast Guard and Coast Guard Reserve. Veterans Day, a VSO, and Taking an Oath

The month of November. November is a month for recognition. Recognizing who and what was done to bring us to this point. We have months that memorialize and months that celebrate. This one, I think, is about recognition.

Veterans Day isn't about heroism, fame, or glory. It's about recognizing that we can't be free without service members. They step forward for a variety of reasons. What they all have in common is they have no idea what may be asked of them. Will you be in luxurious conditions with tropical weather? Some were prior to December 7th, 1941. Will your duty be to oppose a political and economic belief from encroaching on your freedoms in a free society? Maybe you will come to the aid of a nation or respond to an attack on the country. Will you serve in peace, unscathed from the rigors of conflict? No matter what your service was, is, or will be, the path of your commitment is unknown at the time you take the oath. For that, every veteran should be recognized for the remarkable uncertainty you raised your hand for.

The position of a Veterans Service Officer (VSO) is a unique opportunity to assist those that have borne responsibilities and sacrifices associated with serving our country. Few vocations have the uncertainty and peril that can come with volunteering for service. I was speaking with a member of our janitorial crew. I mentioned that a member of the staff volunteered to do a particular assignment. They said, "the person doesn't get paid?" I told them; it can also mean that you are doing something that you didn't have to do. Serving your country in the Armed Forces is perhaps the ultimate volunteer commitment. Everything we do is tied to a citizen accepting that uncertainty by taking an oath. Even those drafted, ultimately didn't have to honor the selection to serve, although there are consequences. Those that did take the oath, that action, binds them forever with the veterans that preceded them.

Four of our most recent VSO hires have started their formal training for accreditation. At the end of their training and after successfully passing the examination,

they will have the foundation to begin their career-long journey in the art of claims and service to their fellow veterans. Welcome to the mission, Michele, Michael, Anthony, and Matthew, reach out when appropriate, help when you can.

Veterans' Home at Quincy: Construction Update



Troy Culbertson, Administrator for the Veterans' Home at Quincy provided an update and tour of its \$240 million reconstruction project to local news media. The project includes the renovation and rehabilitation of the veterans' home

with a new 210-bed, skilled care facility and 80 additional independent living domiciliary rooms. This upgrade will modernize the campus and provide a cost effective, state-of-the-art facility, with single occupancy rooms and a more intimate setting for Illinois' veterans needing skilled nursing care. Troy offered tours of the model domiciliary and skilled nursing rooms. The renovation is on track to be completed for the domiciliary by mid-2023 and the skilled nursing facility in 2024. The project is a federal and state partnership and is part of Governor Pritzker's Rebuild Illinois.

Additionally, the Illinois Veterans' Home at Quincy (IVHQ) provided a campus tour to a local area legislator and legislative staffers. The tour consisted of a ride through the 210-acre campus and the new construction. IVHQ is currently undergoing a \$240 million renovation of the campus with \$194.7 million of the renovation money reimbursed via a federal U.S. Department of Veterans' Affairs (USDVA) grant.

Attendees were able to view replicas of the new buildings that will be open on the campus starting next year. The tour concluded and was followed by a presentation on IDVA's five state-run veterans homes and a Q&A so that legislative staffers could better assist and inform veterans and their families on the application process, eligibility and more. The tour took place outdoors and in non-residential buildings for resident safety. IDVA is always mindful that its five-state run veterans' homes are homes to its veteran residents.
