IDVA Veteran Service Officers (VSO) were deployed across the state this month participating in community events and programs. The intent was to reach as many veterans as possible about how IDVA can help veterans obtain their earned benefits. When we are talking to veterans, we often hear confusion between the Illinois Department of Veterans Affairs (IDVA) and the United States Department of Veterans Affairs (USDVA). The greatest misconception is centered around the VA Health System, which includes Jesse Brown, Illiana, Edward Hines, Marion, Captain James A Lovell Health Care Centers, and many outpatient clinics around the state. USDVA operates

these locations, not IDVA. However, IDVA VSOs are extremely knowledgeable about each location and can connect you to the right people to get you the care you need. Here are a few things to know about IDVA:

- IDVA is your vehicle for information and assistance on obtaining federal and state benefits and services that apply to each veteran. With VSOs located in offices across the state, IDVA works with each veteran to discuss personal, family, and health circumstances to identify which services and benefits will work for you.
- IDVA helps you navigate both systems, so the process is less cumbersome, and you don't miss out on opportunities that are available to you.
- IDVA also offers five Veterans' homes across the state for those seeking skilled nursing home care. These locations are Anna, Chicago, LaSalle, Manteno, and Quincy.

Health Care Enrollment for Illinois Veterans who deployed to Combat Zones

This press release was issued on September 5th by the Marion VA Health Care System. It is published with permission.

Until 11:59pm local time on September 30, 2023, Veterans who deployed to a combat zone, never enrolled in VA health care, and left active duty between September 11, 2001, and October 1, 2013, are eligible to enroll directly in VA health care. This special enrollment period gives Veterans who served in Iraq, Afghanistan, and other combat zones, an opportunity to enroll directly in VA health care without first applying for VA benefits.

VA encourages all eligible Illinois Veterans to visit VA.gov/PACT or call 1-800-MYVA411 to learn more and sign up for VA health care before the deadline. Veterans who are enrolled in VA health care are proven to have better health outcomes than non-enrolled Veterans, and VA hospitals have dramatically outperformed non-VA hospitals in <u>overall quality ratings</u> and <u>patient satisfac-</u> tion ratings. Additionally, VA health care is often <u>more</u> <u>affordable</u> than non-VA health care for Veterans.

This special enrollment period is a part of the PACT Act, the largest expansion of VA health care and benefits in generations. Since President Biden signed the PACT Act into law on August 10, 2022, more than 344,000 Veterans have enrolled in VA health care and more than 4.2 million enrolled Veterans have been screened for toxic exposures. In Illinois alone, more than 373,400 Veterans have received PACT Act benefits and more than 224,300 Veterans have enrolled in VA care.

"Are you a Veteran who deployed to a combat zone but never enrolled in VA health care? If you left active duty between September 11, 2001, and October 1, 2013, you should sign up now," said VA Secretary Denis McDonough. "Even if you don't need this care now, you may need it in the future – and once you're in, you have access for life. But don't wait – the deadline is September 30 – so go to VA.gov/PACT and apply today."

Although this deadline is written into law for this specific group of Veterans, many other groups of Veterans are able to enroll directly in VA health care without first applying for VA benefits – including many Vietnam Veterans, Gulf War Veterans, Veterans who deployed to a combat zone and transitioned out of the service less than 10 years ago, and <u>more</u>. Veterans who do not meet any of the above criteria can often still access VA health care by filing for VA benefits. If a Veteran is granted service-connected disability for a health condition because of military service, they may also be eligible for VA care.

The PACT Act also expanded VA benefits for millions of Veterans, making more than 300 health conditions "presumptive" for service connection. This means that if an <u>eligible</u> Veteran has one of these health conditions, VA automatically assumes that the condition was caused by the Veteran's service and provides compensation and care accordingly. Since the PACT Act was signed into law, VA has delivered more than \$1.85 billion in PACT Act benefits to Veterans and their survivors. VA encourages Veterans and their survivors to apply for these benefits now at VA.gov/PACT.

VA is currently in a full-court press to ensure that as many Veterans as possible enroll before September 30. To date, VA's PACT Act outreach campaign has included more than 2,000 events nationwide, \$13 million in paid media, 60,000 earned media clips, more than 400 million emails and letters to Veterans, the creation of a <u>one-stop-shop PACT Act website</u>, and more. This is the largest outreach campaign in VA history, which has one goal in mind: ensure that all Veterans – and their survivors – get the health care and benefits they deserve under the PACT Act.

The period applies to Veterans who deployed to a combat zone, never enrolled in VA health care, and left active duty between September 11, 2001, and October 1, 2013 – specifically those who served in a theater of combat operations during a period of war after the Persian Gulf War or in combat against a hostile force during a period of hostilities after November 11, 1998.

Camp Lejeune Justice Act

Process put in place to expedite claims

In 2022, the Camp Lejeune Justice Act was passed allowing veterans and family members that were exposed to the drinking water at Camp Lejeune to sue for damages for harm caused by chemicals in the water. As a result of this law, thousands of benefit claims were filed creating a flood and backlog of legal cases in the federal system.

To address the backlog of Camp Lejeune claims, the VA has introduced this settlement option (called the "Elective Option") designed to expedite the compensation process. This allows eligible claimants to receive a predetermined payout without the necessity of the normal legal trial process. The Elective Option is available to certain claimants with qualifying Injuries and who resided or worked at Camp Lejeune for at least 30 days on the Camp Lejeune base from Aug. 1, 1953, to Dec. 31, 1987 The Elective Option is essentially an administrative process established to streamline compensation for veterans who were exposed to contaminated water at Camp Lejeune and subsequently developed specific illnesses. This process operates outside the traditional lawsuit and allows a more direct route to compensation for qualifying veterans.
