#### Alejandra Hernandez

Alejandra is a distinguished Marine Corps veteran whose remarkable leadership and unwavering commitment to the veteran communities have left an indelible mark on countless lives. Alejandra has successfully created awareness around the unique challenges women and LGBTQIA+ veterans face. Alejandra advocated to the clinical leadership at The Road Home Program, where she has worked since

2022, to create a "specialty cohort" for LGBTQIA+ veterans, which will take place in June 2025.

Alejandra Hernandez served in the United States Marine Corps for four years as a Food Service Specialist with Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune Headquarters. She was stationed at the Marine Support Squadron 272 Marine Corps Air Station New River, NC, and was deployed in 2007 to Kuwait, Camp Al Asad, and Camp TQ Air Base. After her time in service, Alejandra attended Waubonsee Community College. She later received a bachelor's degree in Sociology from the University of Illinois Chicago.

She is a member and secretary of the American Veterans for Equal Rights Chapter in Chicago and the Women Marines Association President, IL-4 MAJGEN Angela Salinas Chapter.

**Evamarie Duff**U.S. Army and Illinois National Guard Veteran

Evamarie Duff, is a decorated veteran, a passionate advocate for women veterans, and an inspiring example of resilience, courage, and determination. Following military service, she joined the Joshua W. Harris Memorial VFW Post 2868, where she has held numerous leadership roles. She is also a member of the American Legion, Wounded Warrior Project, Order of the Eastern Star, Daughters of the American

Revolution, and DAV.

As an 88M Transportation soldier, Evamarie played a critical role in convoy security and transportation operations during her deployment to Camp Buehring, Kuwait, and LSA Anaconda, Iraq, in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom.

Despite facing challenges, including a medical evacuation to Germany and the completion of her military career at Fort Knox, Kentucky, in May 2007, Evamarie's dedication to service and leadership only grew stronger.



**Ashley Tubruan** U.S. Navy Veteran

Ashley Tubruan, U.S. Navy veteran, is a dedicated advocate, leader, and recent graduate of the University of Illinois Chicago School of Law, where she is focusing on the rights and wellbeing of veterans. Following her military service, Ashley became a police officer in suburban Chicago, where she became a leader on the force's Crisis Intervention Team and Crisis

Negotiation Unit. During law school, Ashley completed three semesters with the school's pro bono VA legal clinic for veterans. Her leadership and advocacy were instrumental in helping pass legislation to expand Illinois' definition of a "veteran," thereby increasing access to housing and healthcare for previously excluded groups.

Ashley plans to continue staying active in the veteran community and focusing on Military Sexual Trauma (MST) resources, counseling, and support groups in a private and safe environment. Ashley helped launch the national campaign "Face the Fight" in D.C. to assist veterans in crisis. Additionally, she plans to share her experiences with MST and help others gain confidence to succeed.



**Tamala Anderson** U.S. Air Force Veteran

U.S. Air Force Veteran Tamala Anderson's trailblazing leadership brought a new voice to the table and opened doors for other women to step into roles of influence and impact within the veteran support system. She remains a fierce and unwavering voice for equity, recognition, and progress for women who have served.

With over 15 years of experience as a Veterans

Service Officer at the DeKalb County Veterans Assistance Commission since October 2008, she has managed more than 5,000 veteran claims, which have changed lives through dedicated support and expert advocacy. Tamala broke barriers by becoming the Superintendent of a Veterans Assistance Commission, an achievement that was once considered nearly impossible for a woman. She remains a fierce and unwavering voice for equity, recognition, and progress for women who have served.

In the Air Force, she served for the Headquarters Office of Special Investigations and was a Military Training Instructor.

Jill Henry U.S. Army Veteran

Jill Henry, a U.S. Army veteran, is the ambassador for the Women's Memorial, a one-of-a-kind tribute to America's Servicewomen, past and present. She is also a member of Post 635's Honor Guard. She helped coordinate the First All-Women Veteran Flight to Washington, DC, Operation HerStory, from the state of IL. She won Legionnaire of the Year for 2021-2022.

Jill began her military career in 1973 at the

Walter Reed Army Institute of Nursing Program at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, D.C. After graduating with a BSN, followed by commissioning into the Army Nurse Corps (ANC) in 1977, she specialized in Intensive Care Nursing. Following six years of ICU nursing, Jill was accepted into the Anesthesiology for ANC Officers Course, where she earned a Masters of Health Science as a Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist (CRNA).

Jill served in Washington, D.C., Texas, Georgia, Kentucky, and Hawaii with a deployment to Saudi Arabia with the 15th Evacuation Hospital for Operation Desert Shield/Storm. Jill concluded her 20-year career in El Paso, TX, as an instructor in the Anesthesiology for ANC Officers Course. She attained the rank







**Treazure Owens**United States Army Veteran

Treazure Owens is a six-year United States Army Veteran who served in Korea and Europe. She is the founder and chief executive officer of *Treazure Marketing*, which specializes in mission-driven businesses and nonprofits, with an emphasis on veteran services, youth programs, and criminal justice reform. Her clients include the National Veterans Art Museum, No Salt Sailing, Strugglebeard Bakery, and Merging

Veterans and Players. She has also provided informal consulting to organizations such as the Veterans Chamber of Commerce and Illinois Veterans for Change.

Additionally, Treazure served as a mentee, Program Facilitator, and past Social Media Manager for Ladies of Virtue, a nonprofit assisting girls ages nine to 18 in preparing for college and careers, and becoming change agents in their community. She served as one of the faces of its "This Black Girl Campaign," and spoke at its 2024 fundraiser, which raised over \$500,000 for the program.

Treazure has earned numerous accolades, including being named a Chicago Innovation Awards Nominee (2024), receiving the Jesse Brown Community Leader Award (2024), and the Project Management Institute's Team of the Year Award (2014). Her leadership, innovation, and passion continue to open doors and create new pathways for veterans, youth, and communities in need.



Elisabeth Pennix U.S. Navy Veteran

Elisabeth Pennix, an eight-year U.S. Navy veteran, was deployed to Iraq during the surge of forces in 2006-2007 and a Reserve deployment to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba with the Military Commissions from 2015-2016. She began her law practice in the U.S. Navy JAG Corps in 2004.

Elisabeth served as the General Counsel for the Illinois Department of Veterans Affairs, Assistant

Chief Counsel with the Department of Homeland Security, and since 2021, she has been the Deputy General Counsel at Sloan Global Holdings.

In her continued service in the Navy Reserves, Elisabeth is a Captain, Appellate Judge, and is recalled to active duty as the Staff Judge Advocate for the Regional Reserve command at Great Lakes.

Elisabeth is actively engaged with multiple nonprofit organizations, including one she cofounded, Operation HerStory, which honors women in the U.S. Military. She also serves on the boards of the Pritzker Military Museum & Library (PMML) and the Navy League, Chicago Council, and is an active member of Business Executives for National Security (BENS).



**Denisse Montoya** U.S. Air Force Veteran

Denisse Montoya, U.S. Air Force Veteran, is a Peruvian American dedicated to serving her nation and community. She has offered her experience in outreach, engagement, and advocacy to support veterans and their families across Illinois. Following her tenure at the Chicago VA Medical Center from 2016 to 2021, she continues to connect veterans with essential resources.

In December 2024, she brought her voice to the Congressional Hispanic Caucus Roundtable on Veterans and Military Families, championing critical issues such as increased VA staffing, improved services for women Veterans, and the expansion of bilingual outreach programs.

Denisse has been a member of the VA Women's Improvement Network and the SheForce Committee under AllenForce, which empowers women impacted by the military with tools and resources. She also volunteers with Merging Vets and Players and assists with special events at Jesse Brown VA.

She supported a resolution honoring Women Veterans Day, which was adopted by the Chicago City Council. She has led, organized, and supported impactful events, including the Women Veterans Panel Discussion – I Served Too: The Female Veteran Perspective, the Women Veterans' Conference – Sisterhood of Service, the Women Veterans VA Health Enrollment and Claims Clinic, various Resource and Employment Fairs, and the Reds, Whites, and Rosé Women Veterans Day Celebration.

Yvette Jones Swanson, U.S. Army veteran, is the CEO of Vetmeters, LLC., where she designed transformative housing initiatives, including the Beverly Veterans Housing Plan and the Toriano Sanzone "Reformative Housing Models." She educates veterans through professional services, seminars, and public speaking. She has assisted 5,000 homeless veterans in homeownership,

written three books on veteran housing, and conducts workshops at the Jesse Brown VA Hospital.

Yvette is the Founder and CEO of 100 Pretty Purses for Female Veterans, a nationally recognized initiative dedicated to uplifting and celebrating women Veterans for over a decade. With a deep commitment to ensuring women veterans feel appreciated, especially during the holiday season, Yvette has led efforts that go beyond material gifts to foster connection, dignity, and recognition.

**Ashtin Bader** U.S. Navy veteran

Ashtin Bader, U.S. Navy veteran, is a passionate leader within The Fallen Outdoors, a non-profit which organizes outdoor adventures including hunting, fishing, hiking, and camping for veterans, active-duty service members, and Gold Star families. She has played a pivotal role in organizing and leading outdoor excursions that provide women veterans with

connection, healing, and adventure. Her inclusive leadership style creates a safe and empowering space where all participants, regardless of experience, feel welcomed and supported.

In 2024, Ashtin and her team facilitated outdoor adventures for over 475 veterans, with Ashtin personally driving 5,326 miles to support and lead events across the region. Her unwavering commitment to the mission was instrumental in helping the organization achieve its goals.

Beyond logistics and leadership, Ashtin serves as a mentor to fellow women veterans, sharing her expertise in outdoor skills while providing encouragement and guidance. She is deeply attuned to the unique challenges women veterans face and uses her platform to advocate for expanded access to outdoor opportunities and supportive networks.



**Tyra Oliver** U.S. Army Veteran

Tyra Oliver, U.S. Army veteran, served over 4,000 Service Members in supporting behavioral health needs, including walkabouts to check on military members, capability briefs with Commanders, and support that enhanced the fighting force. As the Commander, she promoted Soldiers and, despite many challenges, led a successful mission.

Tyra has been a Clinical Social Worker for more than 28 years, and a United States. Army Reserves Major for 13 years. She has worked at UIC Women's Clinic and Inpatient Mother-Baby unit, providing effective therapy services, addressing complex cases, including trauma and crisis intervention.

Tyra is a Reconnection Workshop Facilitator for the American Red Cross, Services to the Armed Forces (SAF), offering support to military members both in garrison and deployed to ensure Service Members are able to continue their jobs in the face of behavioral health concerns.



**U.S. Senator Tammy Duckworth** U.S. Army Veteran

U.S. Senator Tammy Duckworth is an Iraq War Veteran, Purple Heart recipient and former Assistant Secretary of the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. She was among the first handful of Army women to fly combat missions during Operation Iraqi Freedom. Duckworth served in the Reserve Forces for 23 years before retiring at the rank of Lieutenant Colonel in

2014. She was elected to the U.S. Senate in 2016 after representing Illinois's Eighth Congressional District in the U.S. House of Representatives for two terms. In 2004, Duckworth was deployed to Iraq as a Blackhawk helicopter pilot for the Illinois Army National Guard. On November 12, 2004, her helicopter was hit by an RPG, and she lost her legs and partial use of her right arm.

Senator Duckworth spent the next year recovering at Walter Reed Army Medical Center, where she quickly became an advocate for her fellow Soldiers. After she recovered, she became Director of the Illinois Department of Veterans' Affairs, where she helped create a tax credit for employers that hire Veterans, established a first-in-the-nation 24/7 Veterans crisis hotline, and developed innovative programs to improve Veterans' access to housing and health care.

In 2009, President Obama appointed Duckworth as an Assistant Secretary of Veterans Affairs, where she worked to help end Veteran homelessness, address the unique challenges faced by female as well as Native American Veterans, and create the Office of Online Communications to improve the VA's accessibility for all Veteran generations. In the U.S. House, Duckworth was an advocate for working families and job creation, introducing bills like her bipartisan Friendly Airports for Mothers (FAM) Act—which is now law—to ensure new mothers have access to safe, clean and accessible lactation rooms when traveling through airports and helping lead passage of legislation that enhanced efforts to track and reduce Veteran suicides.

She also passed her Troop Talent Act to help returning Veterans find jobs in the private sector and worked to cut waste and fraud at the Pentagon and throughout government. As Senator, Duckworth is helping lead the charge to protect reproductive freedoms—including the IVF treatments that millions of American families, like her own, rely on to start and grow their families—and fully restore the protections of Roe v. Wade.

She also continues her lifelong mission of supporting, protecting and keeping the promises we've made to our Veterans as well as ensuring that we stand fully behind the troops our nation sends into danger overseas She also continues her lifelong mission of supporting, protecting and keeping the promises we've made to our Veterans as well as ensuring that we stand fully behind the troops our nation sends into danger overseas.

And as a member of the Armed Services Committee, the Foreign Relations Committee and the Veterans' Affairs Committee, Duckworth, who has dedicated her life to serving America's servicemembers and Veterans, has continued building her strong record of leadership on national security and foreign policy issues, including successfully working to strengthen our relations with Indo-Pacific nations and improving security in the region and around the globe, all while also securing significant international investments in Illinois.







**Rose E. Connolly** U.S. Air Force Veteran

Rose E. Connolly, a 23-year U.S. Air Force veteran, where she served primarily as an administrator with four years as an instructor. She has been deeply involved in veterans' organizations, holding leadership and lifetime memberships in groups such as the Air Force Sergeants Association, American Legion, VFW, AmVets, and Catholic War Veterans, where she

also serves as a historian and webmaster. Her contributions to veterans' causes have earned her numerous accolades, including Illinois Veteran of the Month (March 2011) and the 2022 DAR Outstanding Service for Veterans Award.

An active volunteer, Rose participates in Camp Butler Wreaths Across America, serves as Chaplain for the Interveterans Council of Sangamon County, and is a Veterans Assistance Commission board member. She is passionate about history, working as an interpreter for state historic sites, and giving presentations on military history, including the WWI Hello Girls and Civil War reenactments.

Beyond her advocacy and historical work, Rose is a dedicated therapy dog handler, training her dogs, Amber and Sophie, through the Alliance of Therapy Dogs. She also actively supports the Land of Lincoln Honor Flight and is currently learning American Sign Language to expand her outreach.

Her two sons, Sean and Alan, both U.S. Marine Corps veterans, continue the family tradition of service by working at Veterans Centers.



**Dr. Renee Dickerson** U.S. Air Force Veteran

Dr. Renee Dickerson, a seven-year U.S. Air Force veteran, is the founder and CEO of Her Service Matters, LLC., and Victory Place, NFP. She has also worked in various mental health and social service programs, including the Department of Defense and Veterans Affairs, the Department of Child and Family Services, and the Government of Guam. She specializes in community and

military trauma, the relationship between diagnosis and treatment, integration of womanist theory and psychodynamic knowledge, and the application of psychodynamic understanding to the problems of diverse clinical populations, trauma disorders, and dissociative symptoms.

Renee is alumni of the Institute for Clinical Social Work, a member of the NCNW, NAACP, American Legion, Disabled American Veterans, the Chicago Center for Psychoanalysis, Division 39 (Society for Psychoanalysis and Psychoanalytic Psychology), and the American Association for Psychoanalysis in Social Work, and the International Association for Psychoanalytic Self Psychology. Renee believes that we all can exceed our history of trauma and limitations. And that we all can live a happy, healthy, and more productive lifestyle. In her words, "working to grow into our better selves is a true possibility."



**Laura Doss** U.S. Army Veteran

Laura Doss, a thirteen-year veteran of the United States Army, served in the US Army Reserve, the Ohio Army National Guard, the United States Army, and the Illinois Army National Guard until her discharge on July 16, 2003. Laura held three Military Occupational Specialties (MOS): Cargo Specialist, Aircraft Structural, and Military Policeman. At her last unit of assignment, she

was a Sergeant (Promotable), serving as a Military Police Team Leader and Assistant Squad Leader with the 233rd Military Police Company. She was stationed in Germany for three years, served on training missions in Panama and Nicaragua, and at stateside locations. She was activated and remained stateside twice during her time in service for Desert Storm and Operation Noble Eagle. Laura's awards include the Army Commendation Medal, the Army Achievement Medal (with oak leaf cluster), the Good Conduct Medal, Primary Leadership Development Course ribbon, and the German Armed Forces Badge for Weapons Proficiency (Bronze Level)
